How Should Subject Choices Be Made?

If you excel in a subject and have a passion for it, it is crucial to consider studying it seriously, regardless of others' opinions. Strive for the best grades possible in two years' time.

When deciding on your options, make sure you:

Enjoy your studies: at level 3, each subject delves into greater depth compared to GCSE level. Dedication is crucial. You will know whether you have enjoyed a subject whilst studying at school, it is difficult to predict your interest in new subjects at college. Even subjects you previously enjoyed at GCSE may present differently at A-Level. It is essential to review the subject guides below and attend the A-Level taster day in the summer term to gain a better understanding of each subject.

Have an aptitude for subjects you study: A-Levels are more challenging than GCSEs, with complex concepts and in-depth examination questions that demand well-thought-out responses. Attaining at least a Grade 5/6 at GCSE in a subject is essential for success.

Entry Requirements

You will require a minimum of 5 GCSEs at grade 5 and above*. This must include English language and Maths. Individual subjects may have specific entry requirements (see courses for details). This will enable you to tackle studying A-Levels with reasonable confidence of success.

There is some flexibility as we recognise students' abilities and personalised ambitions differ as do the demands of specific courses. Each case will be considered on its merits and advice will be given to individuals to ensure that their best interests are well served. Where possible we will tailor courses to individual needs but ultimately, we will not set pupils up with programmes of study which they are unlikely to succeed.

*A-Level maths and accounting ask for a grade 6 and above. A-Level chemistry ask for grade 6 in chemistry and maths.

Entry Requirements for two (year 13)

If you have found it difficult to handle the requirements of year 12, it is not advisable to proceed to a more challenging year in the second year of your program. The first year covers half of the total A-Level course content, so it is crucial for you to take it seriously and aim for a minimum grade of C. If you consistently performed poorly on your mock exams in the first year, it may be suggested or even required for you to consider switching to a different academic program to ensure you have the best opportunities for the future.


Managing Your Learning

Taking responsibility for your learning is essential for success in your A-level course. While support is available from your subject tutors and Personal Development Coach, ultimately your final grades will reflect the effort you put in. It is important to make the most of the resources available to you.

Your subject tutors, Personal Development Coach, and learning support team will work together to help you set goals, create targets, and track your progress throughout the course. Regular homework and independent study tasks will be assigned to help reinforce your learning and provide feedback on your progress. These tasks also play a crucial role in determining predicted grades for university applications through UCAS.

The Wider Curriculum

As Level 3 A-Level students, your educational journey is composed of various components that collectively form your programme of study. Alongside your substantial A-Level qualifications, your programme of study is made up of a few elements, these elements include:



These elements are designed to provide a comprehensive and enriching learning experience aimed at equipping you with the tools and knowledge necessary for success in your academic and future endeavours.

PPD - Empower Your Learning

Our Personal Progress and Development programmes have been designed to allow weekly contact with Personal Development Coaches in order to build positive pastoral relationships that enable you to progress and thrive. The PPD sessions intend to prepare you for lifelong learning and employment, to develop confidence to explore the world around you and build resilience to overcome challenges. PPD sessions enable you to develop confidence, resilience, values and become positive contributing members of society.

As Level 3 students, it is essential that you take an active role in shaping your educational journey. Engaging with the action planning and target setting process is crucial for your growth and development. This process:

- Empowers you to take ownership of planning your learning journey
- Equips you with the tools to make well-informed decisions
- Helps you establish and achieve both long-term and short-term goals
- Encourages self-evaluation to identify strengths and weaknesses
- Involves setting targets to address weaknesses and accomplish short-term objectives
- Celebrates your accomplishments

Remember, this is a continual process where you will collaborate with your Personal Development Coach and subject tutors regularly to evaluate progress and set new targets for your academic success.

Independent Study

Once you begin your A-Level course, you will often hear about the importance of independent study. But what exactly does this entail? Independent study is a crucial component in achieving your desired grades at A-Level, involving studying outside of your timetabled classes for each subject. Your timetable will include unsupervised study sessions dedicated to independent study for each of your three subjects.

It is recommended that each A-Level subject requires a minimum of 5 hours per week of independent study, totalling 15 hours per week outside of face-to-face sessions.

So, what does independent study include?

- **Teacher set tasks, essays, research** referred to as homework at school.
- Revisiting / rewriting your class notes so that you don't forget them (consolidating your learning) and so that they are more easily accessible for revision for your examinations.
- Reading around the subject or topic you are learning about in class You will be given a reading list for each subject at the start of the academic year.
- **Watching a documentary or DVD** something related to your subject / topic.
- Reading a newspaper article relevant to your subject some of the broadsheet newspapers have sections dedicated to psychology, law, literature and sociology. You will find copies of daily newspapers in the library and online.
- Visits and Trips visiting museums and galleries or trips to the theatre to enhance your understanding of your subjects.
- ▶ Undertaking private research relevant to your area of study.
- Flipped Learning Your teacher sets preparation tasks needed to take a full and active part in a planned lesson.



Building a Strong Foundation with Academic Support

As you transition into adulthood, our teaching staff will acknowledge this shift and empower you to express your individual thoughts and ideas independently. While independence is encouraged, we understand that all learners may require additional support at times. Enrichment
